The Shire Bar & Bistro and The Branch Bar & Public Room provide quality dining to the Twin Cities

Despite opening over a decade apart in separate cities, The Shire Bar & Bistro in Chehalis and The Branch Bar & Public Room have much in common: excellent chefs, a commitment to fine dining, and a shared owner.

Joel Wall opened The Shire in the former Guido's location in 2002.

"Back then, there weren't as many smaller, independent restaurants. That's kind of grown a bit over the last 20 years," Wall said.

The business initially hosted live music performances, benefits, comedy shows and other forms of live entertainment while Wall and his team worked on some unfinished spaces in the building.

"But over the years, we just kind of decided to focus more on the restaurant," Wall said. "It's just a small, neighborhood place that has a longstanding following in the community."

The Shire has become



deeply integrated into downtown Chehalis over the years, Wall said. "All of a sudden, we find ourselves here 21 years later and it's still going strong," he said.

Much of that success has been thanks to The Shire's chef, Robert Lamore, who has been with the business since the beginning.

Another longtime Shire employee, Chris Bruce, became Wall's business partner in The Branch when that opportunity presented itself in 2016.

The owner of the Centralia Square Ballroom, where The Branch is now located, had approached Wall about possibly putting a restaurant into that space, Wall said.

"He talked to me and, over time, we just kind of made that restaurant happen," he

said. "That's a neat spot, you know, being just down from the college. We get a lot of locals, but also a lot of out of town guests."

Unlike The Shire, which is open for lunch and dinner, The Branch is only open for dinner. Chef Anthony Eckerson heads The Branch's kitchen and focuses on elevating simple, classic dishes.

"He's an incredibly

knowledgeable, skillful chef, and ... the things that he does are really incredible," Wall

Both The Shire and The Branch as "scratch kitchens," meaning the businesses do their own shopping and make everything from scratch.

"Both are unique restaurants to the area, so we enjoy them a lot. It's a lot of hard work, but it's well worth it," Wall said.

Over the past few years, I have toured schools, skills centers, community colleges, and many Career and Technical Education (CTE) classrooms around the state and in the 20th Legislative District. Washington state is finally realizing; what many of us already knew; that children don't all learn the same, don't all think the same,

Some students are career ready and other students are college bound. Education must be flexible and help cultivate a student's passion so they can turn that passion into a productive career. That requires Olympia to start thinking outside of the box.

As an employer, as well as a parent of students, I want our education system to be flexible, adaptable, and

teach students how to think and help them develop the

skills most important for our next generation of employees, employers, and leaders.

As the ranking member on

the House Capital Budget Committee, this year we invested \$115 million for the Small School District Modernization program, which provides planning and construction grants for smaller school districts that have significant building deficiencies. A boost to rural communities.

In addition, \$68.2 million was invested in Career and Technical Education projects at Skills Centers and Technical Schools, including \$1.154 million for the Cascadia Tech Natural Resources Learning Center at Kalama High School in the 20th District.

Although the State continues to have the wrong Olympia-down approach on education, I do believe many investments have been made through policy to expand opportunities for our students outside the classroom. This will create a stronger workforce and stronger

communities. Recently, I toured schools in the Centralia School District and met with students to discuss careerreadiness, trades careers, apprenticeships, college and secondary education, as well as opportunities in the legal and governmental fields.

My first stop was Futurus High School, a small pioneering school in an alternative setting that provides a personalized learning environment. I later met with several classes at Centralia Middle School to discuss how to help students build upon their educational foundation to be successful in their personal and professional lives.

After spending many years volunteering in classrooms, serving as a mentor at W.F. West, and helping in school classrooms, a theme has emerged; there is no theme. They all have different passions, motivations, and skills. Some students thrive in brick-and-mortar schools and others need greater flexibility and options. Some learn by 'doing' and others are better at reading and analyzing text.

The advice I gave students during my tours was 'Find your passion. Focus on whether a job you love. Make sure it brings you satisfaction in life. The most fulfilling careers make a positive difference in your life, and the lives of your family, friends, and community.'

Basic education is the paramount duty of the State of Washington. We must continue to invest in diverse learning opportunities, build a solid foundation in reading, writing, and mathematics, and ensure students graduate with life skills that will help them be successful regardless of the job or career. This is what I will continue to advocate for in Olympia.

I will also continue to encourage parents and families to stay involved in their students' learning and education. We have some amazing local schools and local teachers. However, the family home is the first and last classroom a student learns in every day.

JJs ToGo opens its first brick-and-mortar in Centralia after over two years of success

When Jessica Britton's sister-inlaw asked her to meal prep lunches for her out of her tiny Chehalis apartment in November 2021, Britton didn't imagine that fulfilling the simple request would lead her to start a busi-

And it might not have, if not for a timely late-night epiphany.

"I don't have any other explanation besides, like, the Lord woke me up, and I just had the JJs logo in my head and I knew what I wanted to do,"

Originally from California, Britton had fond memories of her late husband buying \$7 burritos for lunch from a Latina woman driving her van to different local mechanics shops

"When I woke up that night, I knew I wanted to do that but like,



do a full-fledged meal for a different

times 10," Britton said. "I'm not going to sell you a \$7 burrito. We're going to

JJs To Go started with Britton taking to-go meal orders out of her 10foot galley kitchen in her apartment.

"My first day selling lunches, I just cold-called (and) I walked into businesses," Britton recalled.

With Jessica and her sister-in-law Devin Britton as co-owners, JJ's ToGo has seen success over the last 2 1/2 years operating out of Jessica's apartment, averaging over 100 lunch orders a day by the end of March 2024.

In January 2024, the Brittons learned that recent changes to the license JJs had been operating under meant that they could no longer base the business out of Jessica's apartment.

"We started praying," Jessica said. "We knew that there was something coming, we just didn't know what."

The Brittons looked at 12 possible locations before settling on purchasing a food cart, despite it not feeling like the right fit.

The morning Jessica was set to drive to Bend to purchase the food truck, she received a Facebook message from Dawn Merchant.

"She asked me 'Do you know who I am?' And I'm like, 'No?'" Jessica

With just 30 minutes before she had to leave to go pick up the food truck, Jessica called Merchant, who she then learned was the owner of Dawn's Delectables & Sandwich

Shoppe in downtown Centralia.

The Brittons ultimately canceled their reservation on the food truck and met Merchant on Jan. 15.

"In meeting with and talking to Jessica and her team over the past few months, we are confident that JJ's ToGo will continue to provide wonderful lunch options for our downtown customers and community," Merchant said," Merchant said in a February news release announcing the closure of Dawn's Delectables after nearly 11 years in business.

Merchant went through several options for passing her downtown location off to JJs To Go. "Just from literally the get-

In her meeting with the Brittons,

go, there was nothing but peace about it. It's been the most seamless transaction and switch-over of anything that we've ever dealt with," Jessica said.

The Brittons officially got the keys from Merchant on April 1 and officially opened with a ribbon cutting on April 22.

"It's going to make Tower Avenue bigger and better," Jessica said of JJs's opening its brick-and-mortar. "It'll set the tone to start kind of revamping and livening up this street."

Joy's Once Upon a Thyme in Chehalis is looking to embark on a new chapter as founder and owner Joy Templeton works to purchase the building her restaurant has operated out of for years.

"I'm happy to say I'm purchasing the building for what I think I can afford, and we'll be heading in that direction," Templeton said at an Economic Alliance of Lewis County Women in Business Seminar in March.

A second-generation chef and longtime caterer, Templeton opened Once Upon a Thyme after moving north from San Francisco.

"After spending a lot of time on an organic farm, I tended to look at food every differently, seeing how it was grown and how it can be more nurturing than satisfying. And that's how I ended up where I am today at Once Upon a Thyme," Templeton said at the seminar.

Once Upon a Thyme focuses on bringing fresh,

healthy dishes made with seasonal ingredients to Chehalis.

The restaurant also hosts cooking classes and has a market that sells prepared dishes to take home, as well as some of the ingredients the restaurant uses.

Coming up, Once Upon a Thyme will have an earlier opening time, 9 a.m., and will have some promotions centered around customer appreciation, Templeton said.

"We're hoping to generate some more customers, or if someone has a meeting or wants to get together earlier," Templeton said.

Once Upon a Thyme has also extended its catering work, frequently catering


