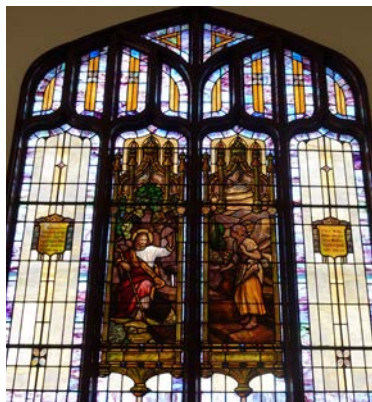

## United Methodist Church: Creativity Flourishes and Compassion Abounds

The United Methodist Church of Chehalis might be well-known around town for the tongue-in-cheek messages on its billboard, but what truly stands out about the church is its extensive involvement in community programs throughout Lewis County.

The mission of United Methodist is: "Inspired by God's love – we cultivate a vibrant community where creativity flourishes, compassion abounds, and all are embraced in genuine fellowship." This mission is reflected in the church's many projects aimed at bettering the community in Chehalis and throughout Lewis County.

United Methodist is led by Pastor Zachary Taylor, a southern Georgia native who

has served as pastor for the past five years. A typical Sunday service draws between 60 and 80 attendees, with additional viewers tuning in via livestream on the church's YouTube channel.

Though there are larger churches in the area, United Methodist is small but mighty, with Pastor Taylor praising his congregation's active participation. "I would say most people in our church are actively involved, which is very unusual if you've ever been in churches in your life, because it's usually like 10% of the people doing 90% of the work," he said.

In addition to donating

time, money, and supplies to various organizations throughout Lewis County—such as Hope Alliance and Union Gospel Mission—United Methodist hosts a range of events each year that contribute to the community's well-being.

Every September, in honor of Saint Francis of Assisi Day, United Methodist hosts "Pawchella," a playful nod to the music festival Coachella. During Pawchella, Pastor Taylor spends the day blessing all kinds of animals and pets brought by attendees. The event also features local animal rescue groups to encourage pet adoptions.

In October, the church organizes "Soupoween," a disability-friendly indoor trunk-or-treat event where families can enjoy trick-or-treating, games, and a shared meal.

Throughout the year, United Methodist conducts multiple blood drives in partnership with the Red Cross. These events are consistently popular, often reaching full donor capacity.

Every July, the church welcomes bikers participating in the Seattle to Portland Bicycle Classic (STP). United Meth-

odist provides a place to sleep, a spaghetti dinner, breakfast, and plenty of snacks for the cyclists. STP also serves as a fundraising opportunity, with proceeds donated back to the community.

Despite already being deeply involved in numerous charitable efforts, Pastor Taylor emphasizes that the church is always seeking new ways to serve. One thing is certain: United Methodist shows no signs of slowing down in its commitment to giving back.

## Washington's affordability crisis – A tax hike too big for businesses to bear

Washington's business community has long been the backbone of our economy, providing jobs, innovation, and essential goods and services.

But today, those businesses are under siege—not by market forces or competition, but by their own state government.

The recently released House Operating Budget proposes the largest tax increase in state history, limiting small

businesses in our state from competing, growing, and even surviving.

The affordability crisis in Washington isn't just about individuals struggling to make ends meet—it's about large and small businesses trying to stay afloat in an increasingly hostile economic environment. Washington state already ranks among the worst states for tax competitiveness.

The majority's recent tax hike proposals won't just affect major corporations; they will also reach deep into the pockets of small and mid-sized businesses, forcing difficult decisions that will inevitably harm workers, consumers, and communities.

If we want to build a stronger economy and keep Washington competitive, we must take a hard look at what's

coming down the pipeline.

One of the most damaging proposals is Senate Bill 5796, which would impose a new payroll tax.

While framed as a measure targeting only the highest wage earners, the reality is it will increase the cost of doing business in Washington across the board. Companies that offer competitive salaries and benefits will be penalized for their success, potentially leading to job cuts, slower wage growth, and reduced opportunities for workers.

Worse yet, this move puts Washington at a disadvantage compared to other states, making it less attractive for

businesses looking to expand or relocate.

Additionally, House Bill 2045 would increase the Business and Occupation (B&O) tax on Washington businesses, particularly financial institutions.

The B&O tax is already one of the most damaging taxes on businesses because it applies to gross revenue rather than profit. This means that businesses with slim margins—such as local retailers, manufacturers, and service providers—will feel the impact regardless of their actual earnings.

Unlike other states that tax profits, Washington's approach punishes businesses for simply making sales, adding yet another layer of financial strain in an already costly environment.

The legislature is also considering two proposals, House Bill 2046 and Senate Bill 5797, that would impose new taxes on financial intangible assets, including stocks and bonds.

While these taxes are marketed as targeting the wealthy, they have far-reaching consequences for employers who rely on capital investment to expand, innovate, and create jobs.

By discouraging investment in Washington businesses, these policies could stifle

## Bethel Church is a Hub for Community Service

Poised at the end of Tower Avenue in downtown Centralia, the Hub City Mission is one of Bethel Church's programs serving residents of Lewis County.

Bethel Church has two campuses in Lewis County: one in downtown Centralia and another in Chehalis. Pastor Josh Gering leads the downtown Centralia campus and also helps run the community dinners Bethel offers to individuals experiencing food insecurity.

The community dinners take place every Tuesday night at both the Hub City Mission

in downtown Centralia and at Toledo Middle School in Toledo. According to Pastor Gering, the community dinners help get people into a welcoming environment where they can enjoy a free meal. "[The community dinners] enable us to serve and also help people be out of the cold... It gives people a warm place to rest, charge a phone, and just be," he said.

In addition to the community meals, the Hub City Mission provides food boxes to those struggling to afford groceries. On the second and fourth Saturdays of each month, Bethel Church members gather to distribute boxes filled with canned goods,

frozen meat, fresh fruits and vegetables, and dairy products.

The Hub City Bike Shop, also part of the Hub City Mission, offers repairs for recreational cyclists as well as for those who rely on their bikes for transportation. The shop operates on a sliding scale of donations, making its services accessible to everyone regardless of financial means. All proceeds from the bike

shop go back into the Hub City Mission to support its programs.

Pastor Gering affirms Bethel Church's deep commitment to serving those in need in Lewis County and living out their faith through action. "We can't meet every need for sure," he said, "but we can try to meet the needs that we can and just try to bless people."

## St. Joseph School is Dedicated to Well-Rounded Education

For more than 100 years, St. Joseph School has provided high-quality, faith-based education to students from across Lewis County. Principal Carissa Talley and the staff at St. Joseph are dedicated to ensuring that students excel both spiritually and academically in a safe and nurturing environment.

Talley began her teaching career at St. Joseph as a second-grade teacher and gradually took on additional roles, teaching writing, middle school math, and science before becoming principal. For Talley, the staff are just as much a reason she loves her job as the students.

"The staff has always been a wonderful part of the job. They are very dedicated. They work hard. They care for and love the kids, and that's part of the reason I love my job so much," said Talley.

St. Joseph offers programs for students from preschool through eighth grade. Students receive a well-rounded education across a variety of subjects, including math, science, religion, and Spanish. In addition to their regular classes, all grade levels participate in a service project each year.

One of the key advantages of attending St. Joseph is the small class sizes. "Because

This individualized attention helps students succeed during their time at St. Joseph and beyond, with most reading above grade level by the time they complete eighth grade.

economic growth and push capital to states with more business-friendly policies. If that weren't enough, lawmakers are looking to raise property taxes as well. House Bill 2049 and Senate Bill 5798 propose increasing the annual property tax growth cap from 1% to 3%, which means that every business owner with a

storefront, warehouse, or office space will see their costs climb year after year.

With rent and operational expenses already on the rise, this additional tax burden will make it even harder for small businesses to survive, let alone thrive.

Homeowners, too, will feel the pinch, as higher property taxes lead to higher housing costs, exacerbating an already

dire affordability crisis.

The consequences of these tax hikes are clear: employers will be forced to cut jobs, raise prices, or move operations elsewhere.

None of these outcomes benefit Washington workers, families, or communities.

Instead of creating new taxes that drive businesses away, lawmakers should focus on reducing unnecessary

spending, lowering regulatory burdens, and fostering a tax environment that encourages investment and job creation.

At a time when businesses are already navigating economic uncertainty, we cannot afford to make Washington even more expensive and uncompetitive.

I urge the business community to take action—contact your legislators, make

your voices heard, and stand against these harmful policies.

Together, we can work towards solutions that foster economic opportunity rather than hinder it.

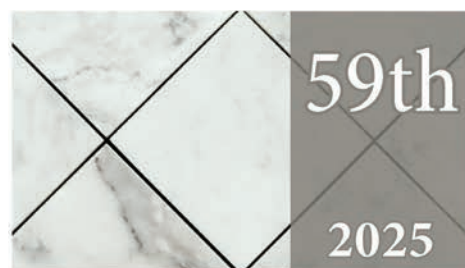
